Statement:

I am a practising architect and designer with wide experience as partner of award winning architectural practice cameronwebsterarchitects, which I founded in 1984. I am a director of Otago Developments and chair a number of professional and community groups. I was Professor of Architecture at Scott Sutherland for 20 years.

It is easy to promise all things, but harder to deliver. I have been encouraged to stand by a wide range of members and non-members from all corners of the country. With these committed and enthusiastic people I aim to make this a more collegiate, transparent and effective organisation, that is more accountable and represents the whole of our



membership, focusing on the challenges of the day: more politically engaged; build on recent initiatives in investment & infrastructure; influence housing policy, land reform and community empowerment. I want to improve the debate on energy and environment, challenge norms, and make our existing commitment to sustainability more meaningful; address our social purposes ethically; make our labour, education and skills better valued and understood; have better procurement and encourage new talent.
